Mr. Corsello explained that the staff reviewed the fees and found they were outdated. A public hearing was held. As a result, they are requesting very modest increases for in-town residents and increases for out of town residents. The parks are in very good condition and these rates help keep the parks accessible to residents.

Mr. Kydes said the parks are in excellent condition and all the credit goes to the staff and their leadership. With all the improvements, there are complaints about non-residents creating over-crowding at the beach. They will now pay higher premiums to use the beach and parks.

Mr. Ignieri spoke in support of the item and said Mr. Prosi Johnson works tirelessly to help the City get a better handle on the construction of the Walk Bridge. She works to keep the Mayor, Public Works and the staff informed; there is a lot of work to be done.

Mr. Hempstead said this item should go back to committee because there are some deficiencies in the contract. There is no requirement for periodic reports in the contract. He asked who is the City, as referred to in the contract. Mr. Coppola said she takes direction from Public Works. Ms. L. King said Ms. Prosi Johnson reports to her. She noted that Ms. Prosi Johnson responds to each request for updates and said that she will ensure there will be quarterly updates.

Ms. L. King said Ms. Prosi Johnson is very valuable due to all the information coming in. She has been to over 160 meetings and is an invaluable resource to the City. Mayor Rilling added that Ms. L. King meets with Ms. Prosi Johnson on a weekly basis.

Ms. Prosi Johnson said the staff is very gracious in meeting with her. She gave an overview of her responsibilities and her involvement in various projects related to the Walk Bridge.

Mr. Hempstead asked about the lack of specifics for deliverables in the contract. He said he would like to see quarterly reports and meetings with the commissions impacted by the Walk Bridge project. He added that he would like to send this item back to committee.

Mr. Livingston said he spoke with Ms. Prosi Johnson and she agreed to make a presentation to the full Common Council. He said this contract has been in place for a year and it is working. If not, it can be terminated in 30 days.

Ms. Prosi Johnson said she responded to correspondence and noted that water quality is critical to the community and the shellfish industry. She said she tries to attend meetings such as the State of the Harbor meeting. She has also spoken with the Conservation official to be sure she is apprised of what is going on. Ms. Prosi Johnson said she encourages Eversource to follow regulatory requirements regarding the Shellfish and Harbor Management Commissions. Ms. Prosi Johnson reviewed steps she has taken to become more educated and informed.

Mr. Igneri asked Mr. Hempstead if he as agreeable to changing item two in the contract to read - will provide quarterly written reports to the Public Works department

Mr. Coppola revised that to read - will provide quarterly written reports to the Public Works Committee and other reports as requested by the Common Council from time to time related to the Walk Bridge.

Mayor Rilling said if any Common Council members have any questions that come from their constituents, they can direct them to Ms. L. King. The quarterly report would be best provided to the Public Works Committee and they can share that report with the rest of the Common Council. That report would be a synopsis of what took place over the quarter. Mr. Coppola will provide appropriate language for the amendment to the contract.

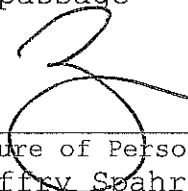

RE: Planning and Zoning Special Appropriation-Plan of Conservation & Development

Attached is a request from the Planning and Zoning Department for a special appropriation in the amount of \$18,937 to satisfy remaining obligations to the city's Plan of Conservation & Development (POCD) consultant, STANTEC. The POCD project was funded by a total appropriation of \$200,000 comprised of \$50,000 in FYE 2017 and \$150,000 in FYE 2018.

At the end of FY 2018 the POCD project account had an available balance of \$18,937. This surplus was not carried forward as part of the annual year-end reserve process. Approval of this special appropriation will replenish the POCD project account to an amount sufficient to close out all invoices due to STANTEC. The funds for this special appropriation will be drawn down from FYE 2019 contingency balance.

The Finance Department recommends approval of the Special Appropriation request of \$18,937. This request will allow the Planning and Zoning department to meet its obligations to the city's POCD consultant.

Re: Special Appropriation Request, Plan of Conservation & Development

The Plan of Conservation and Development was funded in FYE17 with a \$50,000 appropriation and FYE18 with an additional \$150,000 for a total of \$200,000. At the close of this past fiscal year there was \$18,937 remaining unspent of the total appropriated for the project.

I failed to request that this surplus be carried forward for use in this fiscal year as I mistakenly believed that the purchase order would remain open past the June 30, 2018 fiscal year close. I believed that this surplus would have the same treatment as a capital project, but now understand that the operating budget is a single-year budget whereas the capital budget is a multi-year budget.

I apologize for my error, but still need the funds available to make the remaining payments to the POCD consultant, STANTEC. It should be stated that the total funds spent on the project will not exceed what was appropriated.

USE OF CARRYOUT BAGS BY RETAIL ESTABLISHMENTS

§ ____ -1. - Purpose.

The purpose of this article is to preserve and protect the environment in the City of Norwalk and encourage the use of Reusable Carryout Bags by reducing the use of Carryout Bags made of plastic and prohibiting the use of Carryout Bags made of non-recyclable paper.

§ ____ -2. - Definitions.

As used in this article, the following terms shall have the meanings indicated:

CARRYOUT BAG

A bag of any material, commonly plastic or kraft paper, that is provided to a consumer at the point of sale to carry purchases out of the establishment. The term shall not include:

- A. Bags used by consumers inside a Retail Establishment to:
 - 1. Package bulk items, such as fruit, vegetables, nuts, grains, candy, or small hardware items;
 - 2. Contain or wrap frozen foods, meat, or fish, whether prepackaged or not;
 - 3. Contain or wrap flowers, potted plants, or other items where dampness may be a problem;
 - 4. Segregate food or merchandise that could damage or contaminate other food or merchandise when placed together in a bag; or
 - 5. Contain unwrapped prepared foods or bakery goods.
- B. Newspaper bags, door-hanger bags, or laundry-dry cleaning or garment bags.
- C. Bags sold in packages containing multiple bags intended for use as garbage, pet waste, or yard waste bags.
- D. Bags of any type that customers bring to a Retail Establishment for their own use.

RETAIL ESTABLISHMENT

Any person, corporation, partnership, business, or other organization or group, however organized, that transfers merchandise, goods, or materials, including, without limitation, clothing, food, or personal items of any kind, directly to a consumer in exchange for payment. The term includes, by way of example and not limitation, any grocery store, grocery delivery service, department store, clothing store, hardware store, hospital, pharmacy, liquor store, restaurant,

delicatessen, convenience store, food truck, sidewalk vendor, farmers' market, flea market, and any other retail store or vendor. The term shall not include the sale of goods at yard sales, tag sales, or other sales by residents at their home.

REUSABLE CARRYOUT BAG

A bag with handles that is specifically designed and manufactured for multiple reuse that (1) is made of (a) cloth, fiber, or other machine washable fabric, or (b) durable plastic that is at least 12.0 mils (thousandths of an inch) thick, and (2) does not contain lead, cadmium, or any other toxic material, as defined by applicable state and federal standards and regulations for packaging or reusable bags.

§ ____ -3. – Restrictions on Carryout Bags.

- A. No Retail Establishment shall sell, provide, or distribute Carryout Bags made of plastic, other than Reusable Carryout Bags, in the City of Norwalk.
- B. No Retail Establishment shall sell, provide, or distribute Carryout Bags made of paper in the City of Norwalk, unless such bags:
 - 1. Are 100% recyclable;
 - 2. Contain a minimum of 40% post-consumer recycled content (except that an eight pound or smaller paper bag shall contain a minimum of 20% post-consumer recycled content); and
 - 3. Conspicuously display the phrase “Reusable” and “Recyclable” on the outside of the bag and the percentage of post-consumer recycled content.

§ ____ -4. – Charges for Carryout Bags.

- A. Any Retail Establishment that elects to provide Carryout Bags made of paper consistent with Section 3.B. of this article shall charge the consumer at the point of purchase \$.10 for each such bag.
- B. The charge imposed by a Retail Establishment as provided in Paragraph A of this Section shall be retained solely by the Retail Establishment.
- C. All Retail Establishments shall post signs at or near the point of purchase to notify consumers of the provisions of this article. Such signs shall be in both English and Spanish and shall read substantially as follows: “All paper carryout bags provided by this store to a consumer shall be subject to a fee of ten cents per bag. Carryout bags brought by consumers into this store to carry purchased goods from this store shall not be subject to a fee.”
- D. All Retail Establishments shall indicate on the consumer transaction receipt the number of Carryout Bags provided and the total amount of charge imposed. It

shall be a violation of this article for a Retail Establishment to fail to separately itemize the charge upon a consumer's purchase of such bag.

- E. No Retail Establishment shall rebate or otherwise reimburse a customer for any portion of the charge provided in Paragraph A of this Section.
- F. Nothing in this article shall prohibit a Retail Establishment from providing Reusable Carryout Bags for no or nominal cost or encouraging and providing incentives for the use of Reusable Carryout Bags, including credits or rebates for customers that bring their own Reusable Carryout Bags for the purpose of carrying purchases out of the Retail Establishment.
- G. Nothing in this article shall prohibit a consumer from using bags or containers of any type that they bring to a Retail Establishment or from carrying away goods that are not placed in bags.
- H. It shall be presumed that all Carryout Bags sold or used by a Retail Establishment are subject to the charge provided in Paragraph A of this Section until the contrary is established. The burden of proving that such Carryout Bags are not subject to the charge hereunder shall be upon the Retail Establishment so claiming.

§ ____-5. – **Exceptions.**

- A. The charge reflected in Section 4 of this article shall not apply to the extent it would violate the laws of the United States or the State of Connecticut.
- B. The charge reflected in Section 4 of this article shall not apply to the use of Carryout Bags to carry items purchased pursuant to the Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program (SNAP), the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC), or a similar governmental food assistance program.

§ ____-6. – **Enforcement and penalties for violation.**

- A. This article shall be enforced by the Code Enforcement Office or its designee.
- B. Upon determination that a violation has occurred, the Retail Establishment shall be liable for the following:
 - 1. Upon the initial violation, written warning notice that a violation has occurred shall be issued to the Retail Establishment. No penalty shall be imposed for the initial violation;
 - 2. For the second violation, a penalty of one hundred fifty dollars (\$150.00); and
 - 3. For the third and each subsequent violation, a penalty of two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00).

- C. No more than one penalty shall be imposed upon a Retail Establishment in one 24 hour period.

§ ____-7. -- **Severability.**

If any section, clause, sentence or provision of this article shall be adjudged by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable, such adjudication shall not affect the validity or enforceability of any other provision hereof, and the applicability thereof to other persons or circumstances shall not be affected thereby.

§ ____-8. -- **Effective date.**

This article shall become effective six months following its adoption by the Common Council in order to allow Retail Establishments time to dispose of their existing inventory of Carryout Bags made of plastic and convert to alternative packaging materials compliant with this article.

Chapter 74. Recreation and Parks

Article I. Calf Pasture Beach, Transfer Station, Yard Waste Site, and Other City Parks

§ 74-1. Free admission for residents and real property owners with resident pass.

[Amended 7-9-1996]

All vehicles of residents and real property owners of the city shall be entitled to free admission with resident pass to the Norwalk public park system and the transfer station/yard waste site, except as otherwise provided herein.

§ 74-2. Season sticker for residents and property owners of certain landlocked towns.

[Amended 5-10-1977; 7-14-1981, effective 11-1-1981]

All vehicles of residents and property owners of the Towns of New Canaan, Wilton, Weston, Redding and Ridgefield shall be entitled to a season parking privilege sticker to Calf Pasture Park from April 15 to October 15 in each year for a sum to be set pursuant to § 74-24 of the Code of the City of Norwalk.

§ 74-3. Parking fees.

[Amended 6-12-1973; 6-8-1976; 5-10-1977; 7-14-1981, effective 11-1-1981]

A.

For all vehicles of persons other than those provided for in the two preceding sections, a parking fee of a sum to be set pursuant to § 74-24 of the Code of the City of Norwalk shall be charged from January 1 to December 31 in each year.

[Amended 7-13-1982]

B.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Common Council may from time to time, by resolution, change the parking fees set out herein or may waive their imposition during short periods of time for special occasions or events.

§ 74-4. Resident pass for certain residents and real property owners.

[Amended 7-13-1982; 2-22-1983; 7-9-1996; 4-8-2003; 2-22-2005]

A.

The City will provide a resident pass for each of the following:

(1)

Residents and real property owners of the City.

- A. The City of Norwalk Resident Pass is used by Norwalk residents and real property owners for access to the Norwalk Transfer Station and Yard Waste Site, with non-commercial cars, SUVs, and/or minivans. The pass must be displayed on the driver's side dashboard during use of both facilities.
- B. Special Permits are required for non-commercial pick-up trucks, vans and/or trailers that use either the Norwalk Transfer Station or Yard Waste Site. These special permits are issued by the Department of Public Works.
- C. Commercial Permits are required for all commercial vehicles that use either the Norwalk Transfer Station or Yard Waste Site. These special permits are issued by the Department of Public Works.

(2)

Residents of the surrounding towns named in § 74-2 of this Code will be supplied a sticker.

B. The sticker shall be prominently and permanently displayed as required by the Recreation and Parks Department and shall be nontransferable. Failure to display said sticker in a prominent and permanent manner as required by the Recreation and Parks Department shall be grounds for refusal into Calf Pasture Park, unless the nonresident fee is paid.

C.

No fee shall be charged to Norwalk residents or real property owners for a resident pass.

§ 74-5. Waterfront parking.

No vehicles other than those owned by residents or real property owners of the City shall park in the parking place along the waterfront.

[1]

Editor's Note: For parking provisions in general, see Ch. 98, Vehicles and Traffic.

§ 74-6. Fee for use of picnic tables in Shady Beach.

A fee to be set pursuant to s74-24 of the Code of the City of Norwalk shall be charged for use of each picnic table in the area known as "Shady Beach" on Saturdays, Sundays and holidays during the beach season.

§ 74-7. Unlawful parking in Shady Beach.

No vehicle other than those owned by residents or real property owners of the City shall be allowed to park in the area known as "Shady Beach."

§ 74-8. Playing ball; exchanging flying objects; kicking objects; dogs; fires.

[Amended 7-14-1981]

A.

No person while at Calf Pasture Beach shall play hardball or softball, throw or otherwise exchange any flying object or projectile, kick or hit any ball or other object on the beach proper or in the water within 300 feet of the shore.

B.

No animals shall be allowed on the beach, except an ADA service animal.

C.

No fires shall be lit in city parks except in designated areas.

§ 74-9. Unlawful changing to bathing apparel.

No person shall change into or out of bathing apparel at the park in any place but in a bathinghouse.

§ 74-10. (Reserved)

[1]

Editor's Note: Former § 74-10, Clamming, was repealed 5-28-1991.

§ 74-11. Power boats; unlawful operation.

No power boat shall be operated within a point from the breakwater north to the end of the park line within 300 feet of the shore.

§ 74-12. Glass containers prohibited; throwing of debris prohibited.

[Amended 7-14-1981]

A.

No person shall bring or carry any glass beverage container into or use same within the premises of any city beach, park, boat basin or marina or other property comprising the facility, except that souvenir glass beverage containers may be sold in conjunction with events approved by the Common Council and licensed by the City Clerk, pursuant to Chapter 14 of the Code.

[Amended 8-23-1983]

B.

There shall be no throwing of any debris on the beach or in any part of any park.

§ 74-12.1. Sale of goods and solicitation restricted.

[Amended 7-14-1981]

The exposure or display for sale of any food or beverage and goods or wares, solicitation of any contribution or display of any advertising for commercial purposes, except upon specific written authority of the Recreation and Parks Commission, is prohibited within the premises of any city beach, park, boat basin or marina.

§ 74-13. Curfew.

[Added 7-14-1981;[1] amended 8-23-1988]

Hours for use of the city parks by the public shall be established and may be amended from time to time by the Director of Parks and Recreation, subject to the approval of the Common Council. The Director shall submit the proposed schedule of hours to the Parks and Recreation Committee. The Committee shall hold a public hearing thereon which hearing shall conform to the requirements of § 1-191.1. Following the public hearing, the Committee shall forward the proposed schedule of hours to the Common Council for approval.

[1]

Editor's Note: This ordinance also repealed former § 74-13, Enforcement.

§ 74-13.1. Violations and penalties.

[Added 7-14-1981[1]]

Any person violating any provision of Chapter 74, Article I, shall be subject to a fine not to exceed \$100 for each offense. Each violation of a separate section of this ordinance shall be considered a separate offense and shall not merge with a violation of any other section of this ordinance. Each violation continuing more than one day shall constitute a separate offense for each day said violation continues.

§ 74-2. Season ticket-sticker for residents and property owners of certain landlocked towns.

All vehicles of residents and property owners of the Towns of New Canaan, Wilton, Weston, Redding and Ridgefield shall be entitled to a season parking privilege sticker ticket to Calf Pasture Park from May-23 April 15 to October 15 in each year for a sum to be set pursuant to § 74-24 of the Code of the City of Norwalk.

§ 74-3. Parking fees.

[Amended 6-12-1973; 6-8-1976; 5-10-1977; 7-14-1981, effective 11-1-1981]

A.

For all vehicles of persons other than those provided for in the two preceding sections, a parking fee of a sum to be set pursuant to § 74-24 of the Code of the City of Norwalk shall be charged from January 1 to December 31 in each year.

[Amended 7-13-1982]

B.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Common Council may from time to time, by resolution, change the parking fees set out herein or may waive their imposition during short periods of time for special occasions or events.

§ 74-4. Stickers-Resident pass for certain residents and real property owners.

[Amended 7-13-1982; 2-22-1983; 7-9-1996; 4-8-2003; 2-22-2005]

A.

The City will provide a different color sticker-resident pass for each of the following:

Residents and real property owners of the City.

- A. The City of Norwalk Resident Pass is used by Norwalk residents and real property owners for access to the Norwalk Transfer Station and Yard Waste Site, with non-commercial cars, SUVs, and/or minivans. The pass must be displayed on the driver's side dashboard during use of both facilities.
- B. Special Permits are required for non-commercial pick-up trucks, vans and/or trailers that use either the Norwalk Transfer Station or Yard Waste Site. These special permits are issued by the Department of Public Works.
- C. Commercial Permits are required for all commercial vehicles that use either the Norwalk Transfer Station or Yard Waste Site. These special permits are issued by the Department of Public Works.

B.

C.

No fee shall be charged to Norwalk residents or real property owners for a park sticker resident pass.

§ 74-5. Waterfront parking.

No vehicles other than those owned by residents or real property owners of the City shall park in the parking place along the waterfront.

§ 74-6. Fee for use of picnic tables in Shady Beach.

Re: Narrative for November, 2018 Tax Collector's Report

As of the end of November, 2018, five months into the current fiscal year, we had collected nearly \$172 million, or **52.84%** of our \$325 million adjusted tax levy. The tax levy itself increased by more than \$3.5 million between October and November with the addition of the motor vehicle supplemental billing that comes due January 1. In addition, as of the end of November, 2018, we collected nearly \$8.3 million of our sewer use levy, or **51.25%**. We also collected 79.14% of the year's IPP (Industrial Pretreatment Program) fee on behalf of the Water Pollution Control Authority. Compared with the prior fiscal year, we are very slightly behind with regard to current taxes (.04%) while ahead with regard to sewer use (.05%).

Also, through the month of November 2018, we showed a net collection of more than \$2.7 million in back taxes, interest, lien fees and other fees. This amount is in excess of \$800,000 more than what had been collected in the prior fiscal year as of the end of November. The July 2018 tax sale contributed to robust delinquent collections at the end of the prior fiscal year, and the beginning of this current one. Please note that our figures are *net of refunds and credits* that have to be given due to court cases where taxpayers successfully appealed their assessment and were due money back.

The second installment tax billing will be due January 1, 2019 and payable by February 1, 2019. Bills are being mailed to Norwalk taxpayers this week, in order to allow taxpayers to budget their money wisely prior to holiday shopping and enable us to avoid the bulk of holiday mail. The bills being sent reflect payments and adjustments made through November 30, 2018 only, the day we ran the file used by our printer. Taxpayers may pay by mail, or in person at City Hall or at one of 13 participating bank branch locations. They may pay on line or over the telephone, and we accept credit, debit and ATM cards, as well as ACH payments (E-Check). The additional cost for paying by E Check is only \$1.50, and may be a sensible alternative to either having to make a trip to pay in person, or enduring the potential uncertainty of mail delivery. We have updated our website and done other advance work to prepare for this collection period, and expect most taxpayers to receive their bills within days.

We are still dealing with paperwork and mailings relative to the tax sale that was held on July 23, 2018. We started with more than 220 properties in the sale. We sold 15 properties and the total amount we collected was in excess of **\$5.03 million**. The redemption period for the sale will expire on January 23, 2019. So far, six of the 15 properties (not counting boat slips) that we sold have already redeemed. We anticipate our next sale will be in July 2020, and we will start planning for that sale in November 2019.

As 2019 is not a tax sale year, we will focus on business personal property and motor vehicle collection enforcement over the next 12 months. Maintaining a high current collection rate by efficiently enforcing collection of current and past due taxes allows budget making authorities to set lower mill rates, because there can be less of an 'allowance' for anticipated uncollectibles. A lower mill rate is effectively 'tax relief' for each and every taxpayer, arguably one of the most equitable forms of tax relief we can provide.

This project is for professional services to conduct a flyover of Norwalk for aerial photography at 3 inch resolution with obliques. The aerial photography is then integrated with the City's GIS platform and made available to other departments who rely on spatial information, such as Zoning, Public Works and the Assessor. This flyover will be performed in spring 2019 when there is no canopy on the trees. Currently, there is no plan by State of CT or WestCoG for flyover. The last State flyover in 2016 did not include obliques or measuring tools.

Oblique imagery differs from traditional top-down aerial imagery by being captured at an angle of 40 to 45 degrees with the ground, designed to provide a more natural perspective and make objects easier to recognize and interpret and allows viewers to see and measure not only the top of objects but the sides as well. These aerial images are captured from the north, south, east, and west directions to offer a 360-degree view of every property and parcel. Traditional top-down imagery does not offer the ability to tell how tall buildings are, or gather any information about buildings.

Many internal departments rely on updated aerial photography for their daily workflows. By viewing top down imagery and oblique imagery the Assessor

Department staff can inspect homes and businesses from the office finding untaxed structures such as additions and pools. Another benefit is the ability to accurately confirm measurements and capacities and add value for marinas, marina bulkheads, and docks and piers. Especially when staff are unable to physically do so because of inaccessibility due to tides.

Public safety also benefits from this aerial photography. The Fire Department uses aerial photography in the apparatus to locate fire hydrants and structure locations. Public works uses it for planning engineering projects to locating assets in the field. Building, Code, Planning & Zoning all use it for planning and inspection purposes.

The public also rely on it. Real estate agents use the City's GIS to help their clients research Norwalk. Plus by acquiring new aerial photography the City continues to build the historical documentation of the changing landscape that is Norwalk.

GIS aerial photography was identified as a priority project in the 2018/2019 IT/GIS Capital budget and funding of \$24,100.00 was approved for the project. The project was unanimously approved by the ITT Committee at its October 3, 2018 meeting.

The specific action requested is:

Authorize the Purchasing Agent to issue purchase orders to Eagle View, a sole source provider, for the acquisition of aerial photography of the entire City of Norwalk, for an amount not to exceed \$23,530.50, per proposal Q-23970, GSA contract number GS-35F-0801N, account 09190600-5777-C0375 and forward onto the Common Council for further action.

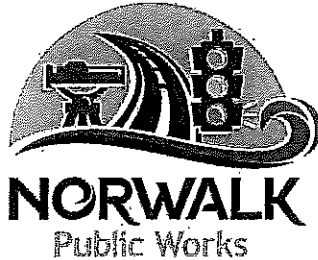

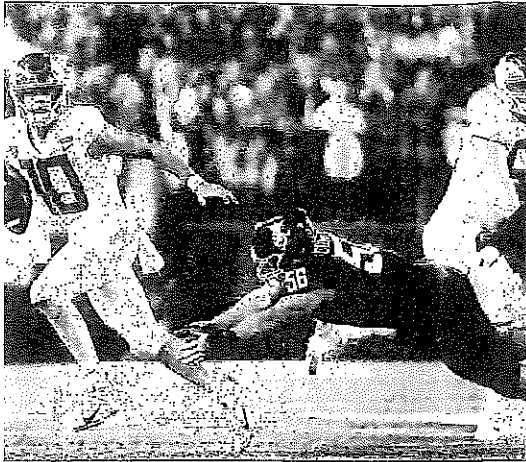
